### From Father Tim

In the Epiphany reading from Isaiah, the prophet forecasts the coming of the Savior some 600 years later. The power and splendor of the newborn Savior is prevalent. Even though, in many respects, the world is still dark, the Lord shines over all of the believers.

"You shall be radiant at what you see, your heart shall throb and overflow": true excitement, excitement beyond belief, as the Son of God is in their midst. And as we know, the Son of God is in our midst everyday of our lives; and knowing this, our hearts should be radiant at all times.

The Magi traveled for miles to see the Lord. Some scholars have stated it took one-and-a-half years of travel to see the new born Savior. Matthew's gospel does not talk about the number or political status of the Magi. Pope Benedict XVI explained it was possible that the Magi may have been a part of a Persian priesthood, but it is highly unlikely that they had Jewish roots.

Who were the Magi? Whether astronomers, kings, or men of great wisdom, they were Gentiles who were called to seek the Lord; in this case, the newborn King. God uses the natural arena, a star which was a celestial event that took place at the time of the birth of Christ. Regardless how it happened, the Magi answered the call to seek the Lord, traveling some 600 miles to do so.

Herod the Great was Jewish in religion, but Idumean in origin. Appointed by Rome as the King of Judea in 40 B.C., his position as King of Judea lasted 44 years. Herod rebuilt the Temple, and was regarded as an efficient leader; but his downfall was that he wanted power and control. And he would do anything to maintain that power, including ordering the deaths of members of his own family. So this talk about a newborn King made him extremely jealous and deceptive towards the Magi, as he privately plotted to kill the Christ.

Herod tells the Magi to go find out about this child so that he too could go and give him homage. Deception was in Herod's heart. When the Magi reached the Lord, they 'prostrated' themselves in front of the newborn King. They worshiped the Lord. Their journey was complete; they reached their destination, and they were filled with great joy as the Christ Child was in their midst. They were in awe of the beautiful mystery that surrounds them.

The Magi brought Christ gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh. The Magi simulated Israel, as the Gentile nations brought these gifts to the God of Israel. The gifts they brought signify the mystery of the Word Incarnate. Gold symbolized royalty, as the King of Kings is in their midst. Frankincense relates to Christ's divinity; and myrrh represents Christ's humanity, especially His eventual passion and death for all of us.

St. Gregory the Great states that these three gifts represent what we are to give to the Lord everyday of our lives. Gold is Christ's wisdom which needs to shine in our hearts at all times. Frankincense represents prayer and adoration as we honor the Lord with all of our hearts. And myrrh represents the daily sacrifices that we make to the Lord.

The Magi were warned in a dream to avoid Herod and to go back home using a different route. THE MAGI HAVE CHANGED DIRECTION. THEY HAVE TURNED AROUND; A CONVERSION HAS TAKEN PLACE. And now they have been enlightened to follow the path of the King of Kings, leading to everlasting life.

We all have different gifts and talents to offer the Lord in our lives. But the best gift that we can give our King is the beauty of ourselves, created in God's image, called to holiness, and called to follow the Lamb wherever He goes. May we listen to the wisdom of God that is in our hearts and follow the Lord with complete trust – that trust that will lead all of us to life everlasting. We ask this through Christ our Lord, Amen.

# **Liturgical Life**

### Jesus to Jordan's Waters Came

Water has always held deep spiritual significance throughout salvation history. In the Book of Genesis, we see the Spirit of God hovering over the waters at creation, bringing order out of chaos. The waters of the flood in Noah's time symbolize both judgment and salvation, while the parting of the Red Sea liberates the Israelites from slavery. In the New Testament, water becomes a sign of cleansing, life, and rebirth, culminating in the sacrament of baptism. Through water, we are incorporated into the Body of Christ and named as children of God. These themes find their ultimate expression in the baptism of Jesus, where the waters of the Jordan reveal His identity as the Son of God and inaugurate His public ministry. This symbolism of water is beautifully captured in the hymn Jesus to Jordan's Waters Came.

Fr. Michael Joncas (b.1951), a renowned composer and theologian, reminds us of the significance of Jesus' baptism: Jesus, though sinless, chose to be baptized by John as an act of humility. This act prefigures His death and resurrection, marking the beginning of His public ministry and the revelation of His divine Sonship.

Each stanza unfolds a different aspect of this event, inviting us to meditate on its layers of meaning. From the voice of the Father declaring Jesus as "Beloved Son" to the descent of the Holy Spirit as a dove, the text reveals this sacred mystery. Moreover, it challenges us to reflect on our own baptism, calling us to renew our commitment to live as disciples of Christ.

The text is sung to the hymn tune *BROTHER JAMES' AIR*, composed by James Leith Macbeth Bain (1840-1925). The hymn tune first appeared in Bain's collection *The great peace: being a New Year's greeting to our motherland and the nations at present in conflict and a welcome to them all to the feast of the great peace* and was published in 1915, just after the start of the First World War. He founded the Brotherhood of Healers which used songs in their healing sessions. *BROTHER JAMES' AIR* is characterized by its flowing melody. Its gentle broad contours evoke a sense of peace which leads us to a deeper reflection.

The text and melody draw us closer to the mystery of Christ's baptism and reminds us our own baptismal calling.

As we sing, may we hear the Father's voice echoing in our hearts, reminding us of our identity as children of God. And may the Spirit, who descended upon Jesus in the form of a dove, inspire us to live lives of humility, service, and love.

# SAINT FRANCIS PEACE THROUGH JUSTICE MINISTRY

### THE BLESSING BOX

You've probably seen the notice in the bulletin about the Blessing Box. Or perhaps you've heard Father Tim mention the Blessing Box in his announcements at the end of Mass. And perhaps you've wondered:

### WHAT EXACTLY IS THE BLESSING BOX?

The **Blessing Box** is a small community pantry located behind the Church next to the basketball hoop. It resembles a Little Free Library but is not a book depository. It is a cooperative venture between the Saint Mary Pastoral Team and the St. Francis Peace Through Justice Ministry.



### WHAT IS THE PURPOSE OF THE BLESSING BOX?

The purpose for the **Blessing Box** is to provide certain items for people who may need them. It could be someone who is homeless, someone who is hungry, someone who is cold, or perhaps someone who just needs a little something to get them through the day. There are no eligibility requirements.

### WHAT ITEMS ARE STOCKED IN THE BLESSING BOX?

The **Blessing Box** is stocked with food items all year long. We are looking for items that can be eaten by hand and do not require utensils, can openers, or microwaves. Some examples are granola/cereal bars, small bags of nuts or trail mix, individually-wrapped jerky sticks, bags of fruit snacks, or small boxes of cereal. We do not accept canned goods or large boxes of food. We also like to keep small toiletries in the **Blessing Box**, such as the small bottles of shampoo and lotion and small bars of soap like you find in motel rooms.

During the summer we try to provide small bottles of water, hats, sunscreen, and insect repellent. In winter we look for donations of hats, gloves, scarves, hand and feet warmers, and small blankets.

### WHY IS SAINT MARY'S DOING THIS?

The idea for the **Blessing Box** was brought to the St. Francis Peace Through Justice Committee by a member of the Pastoral Team two years ago last November as a result of people coming to the Parish Office looking for help. After some discussion, the Committee decided to take on the project as a way to answer Jesus' admonition to "feed the hungry."



### HOW CAN I CONTRIBUTE TO THE BLESSING BOX?

We'd love to have your donations! There is a black wire basket in the *Gathering Space* with a sign that says "*Blessing Box*." Items can be placed in the basket when you come to Mass. The basket is emptied weekly with items put into the Blessing Box every other day!

Thank you for your continued support of this important ministry! It may seem like a small thing to donate a box of granola bars or a pair of gloves. But to someone who is cold and hungry, *your donation can mean the world!* God Bless You All!
