Decree on Designating Sacred Places for the Jubilee Indulgence

To the faithful of the Diocese of Helena:

Greetings to you this Jubilee Year of Hope! Last May, our Holy Father Pope Francis released the Bull of Indiction *Spes non confundit* ("Hope does not disappoint") announcing this Jubilee Year 2025. A Jubilee Year is a significant time in the life of the Church marked by pilgrimages, processions, and a special invitation to the Sacrament of Penance. In it, we are called to receive God's mercy by participating in the Corporal and Spiritual Works of Mercy and, in a special way, through the practice of the Jubilee Indulgence. In response to this, and in accordance with the directives of the Holy See, I, Austin Anthony Vetter, Bishop of Helena, hereby designate the following sacred places within the Diocese of Helena as places where the faithful may obtain the Jubilee Indulgence:

- Cathedral of St. Helena, Helena
- St. Teresa of the Little Flower Church, Browning
- St. Joseph Church, Libby
- St. Ignatius Mission Church, St. Ignatius
- St. Rose of Lima Church, Dillon
- Holy Rosary Church, Bozeman
- All Saints Chapel, Carroll College, Helena

These sacred places have been chosen to reflect the spiritual significance of pilgrimage and to foster deeper conversion among the people of God. The visit is not merely an outward action but a reflection of the soul's pilgrimage toward God. In making a pilgrimage or pious visit to these sacred places, the faithful may gain the Plenary Indulgence by fulfilling the following conditions:

- Participation in the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass (or another service such as the Liturgy of the Hours, the Way of the Cross, or the Rosary) and Reception of Holy Communion (at least within 7 days before or after the visit)
- Prayer for the intentions of our Holy Father Pope Francis
- A sincere detachment from sin, including making a Sacramental Confession (at least within 7 days before or after the visit)

Those who cannot participate in a pilgrimage or pious visit for a serious reason may obtain the Jubilee Indulgence by being truly repentant, reciting the Lord's Prayer, Nicene Creed, and prayers for the Jubilee Year, offering up their sufferings. Furthermore, the faithful may obtain the indulgence by participating seriously in the Corporal and Spiritual Works of Mercy as if making pilgrimage to Christ present in those served, especially to share hope.

Despite the rule that only one plenary indulgence can be obtained per day, the faithful who have carried out an act of charity on behalf of the souls in Purgatory, if they receive Holy Communion a second time that day at a Eucharistic Celebration, can obtain the plenary indulgence twice on that same day, applicable only to the deceased.

The period for obtaining the Jubilee Indulgence coincides with the Jubilee Year, as outlined by the Holy See, beginning December 29, 2024, and ending on December 28, 2025.

Ecclesiastical Notary

As the efforts to repair our baptismal font continue, we can look to the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) for guidance and wisdom concerning our baptistery.

The rites of baptism, the first of the sacraments of initiation, require a prominent place for celebration. Initiation into the Church is entrance into a Eucharistic community united in Jesus Christ. Because the rites of initiation of the Church begin with baptism and are completed by the reception of the Eucharist, the baptismal font and its location reflect the Christian's journey through the waters of baptism to the altar. This integral relationship between the baptismal font and the altar can be demonstrated in a variety of ways, such as placing the font and altar on the same architectural axis, using natural or artificial lighting, using the same floor patterns, and using common or similar materials and elements of design.

The location of the baptismal font, its design, and the materials used for its construction are important considerations in the planning and design of the building. It is customary to locate the baptismal font either in a special area within the main body of the church or in a separate baptistery. Through the waters of baptism the faithful enter the life of Christ. For this reason the font should be visible and accessible to all who enter the church building. While the baptistery is proportioned to the building itself and should be able to hold a good number of people, its actual size will be determined by the needs of the local community.

Water is the key symbol of baptism and the focal point of the font. In this water believers die to sin and are reborn to new life in Christ. In designing the font and the iconography in the baptismal area, the parish will want to consider the traditional symbolism that has been the inspiration for the font's design throughout history. The font is a symbol of both tomb and womb; its power is the power of the triumphant cross; and baptism sets the Christian on the path to the life that will never end, the "eighth day" of eternity where Christ's reign of peace and justice is celebrated.

The following criteria can be helpful when choosing the design for the font:

- 1. One font that will accommodate the baptism of both infants and adults symbolizes the one faith and one baptism that Christians share. The size and design of the font can facilitate the dignified celebration for all who are baptized at the one font
- 2. The font should be large enough to supply ample water for the baptism of both adults and infants. Since baptism in Catholic churches may take place by immersion in the water, or by infusion (pouring), fonts that permit all forms of baptismal practice are encouraged.
- 3. Baptism is a sacrament of the whole Church and, in particular, of the local parish community. Therefore the ability of the congregation to participate in baptisms is an important consideration.
- 4. The location of the baptistery will determine how, and how actively, the entire liturgical assembly can participate in the rite of baptism.
- 5. Because of the essential relationship of baptism to the celebration of other sacraments and rituals, the parish will want to choose an area for the baptistery or the font that visually symbolizes that relationship. Some churches choose to place the baptistery and font near the entrance to the church. Confirmation and the Eucharist complete the initiation begun at baptism; marriage and ordination are ways of living the life of faith begun in baptism; the funeral of a Christian is the final journey of a life in Christ that began in baptism; and the sacrament of penance calls the faithful to conversion and to a renewal of their baptismal commitment. Placing the baptismal font in an area near the entrance or gathering space where the members pass regularly and setting it on an axis with the altar can symbolize the relationship between the various sacraments as well as the importance of the Eucharist within the life and faith development of the members.
- 6. With the restoration of the Order of Christian Initiation of Adults that culminates in baptism at the Easter Vigil, churches need private spaces where the newly baptized can go immediately after their baptism to be clothed in their white garments and to prepare for the completion of initiation in the Eucharist. In some instances, nearby sacristies can serve this purpose.

Liturgical Life

Pilgrims of Hope—Hymn for the Jubilee Year 2025

Attending the Day of Reflection on January 25, 2025, led by Prof. Katherine Greiner, was an enlightening experience. The theme, "Becoming Pilgrims of Hope," echoes Pope Francis' announcement of the Jubilee Year 2025. Through Katherine's insightful teachings and engaging small group discussions, I reflected on how Saint Mary could be a pilgrim church.

Throughout history, music has been the heartbeat of Christian pilgrimage. St. Francis of Assisi, often called the Troubadour of God, wandered the world with a song in his heart, proclaiming the Gospel not only through words but also through melody. For him, music was a means to awaken the soul to the beauty of God.

Music has always accompanied the great movements of the Church. The early Christians sang hymns in the catacombs; medieval pilgrims chanted on their way to Compostela; reformers, martyrs, and missionaries carried their faith forward with songs on their lips. The Church does not journey in silence—she sings! And as we prepare for the Jubilee Year 2025, "Pilgrims of Hope" serves as both a proclamation and a prayer, urging us forward in faith and unity.

The refrain of "Pilgrims of Hope" acknowledges God as the eternal source of life and affirms a steadfast reliance on Him. Verse 1 highlights the power of God's Word, bringing light to all nations and peoples. It speaks of humanity's fragility and dispersion, yet finds a home in Christ. Verse 2 portrays God as a source of hope. It emphasizes the Spirit's transformative power. Verse 3 calls us to recognize God's presence, as Christ—born in time—becomes the guide for us.

Musically, the hymn reflects this journey. The refrain begins with an energetic leap, emphasizing the word "flame" and propelling us to proclaim with full breath that "my hope is burning." In contrast, the verses follow a more linear, stepwise motion, creating a contemplative atmosphere that allows the words to resonate deeply. The union of text and melody makes this hymn a powerful expression of faith.

2025 is the Jubilee Holy Year, the 2,025th anniversary of the Incarnation of our Lord, an "event of great spiritual, ecclesial, and social significance in the life of the Church." The concept of "Jubilee" has its origins in the Book of Leviticus (Chapter 25) as a special year of reconciliation, pilgrimage, and coming home. Pope Francis has designated the 2025 Holy Year as a time to renew ourselves as "Pilgrims of Hope."

Just as the troubadours of old sang their way through their journeys, so too must we raise our voices in this Jubilee year. "Pilgrims of Hope" is a song of marching forward under God. In a world often marked by division and despair, our singing becomes a witness to the hope that God gives us.

May Saint Mary, like a great choir, continue to sing as one body, lifting our voices in unison with the communion of saints. And may "Pilgrims of Hope" accompany us, reminding us that we walk not alone but with Christ. Let us sing, let us journey, and let us hope—together.

Catholic Social Teaching: Call to Family, Community and Participation

"How we organize our society - in economics and politics, in law and policy - directly affects human dignity and the capacity of individuals to grow in community...We believe people have a right and a duty to participate in society, seeking together the common good and well-being of all, especially the poor and vulnerable."

~ United States Catholic Conference of Bishops

Matt Brower, Executive Director of the Montana Catholic Conference (MCC), in a recent presentation to Saint Mary Catholic Community, described the role of the Conference and of all Catholics as "Bring [Ing] the Gospel into the world." He emphasized the need for the truth of Jesus and for the social justice voice in our politics. He related the call to participation in politics to our Baptismal promises, to the gifts we are given in Eucharist, to scripture, and to the themes of Catholic Social Teaching. To be living and effective, faith needs to be expressed in works and works need to be grounded in and guided by faith. He referenced Saint Teresa of Calcutta's philosophy of connecting our actions to our interior spiritual life.

MCC's work is inspired by Catholic Social Teaching and sacred scripture. It is guided by the two bishops in Montana and the question, "How are those on the margins faring?" Their mission is to "advocate for the weak and vulnerable and act as a catalyst for the transformation of society." MCC networks with other like-minded organizations to lobby legislators and to testify on bills. The MCC sends out legislative alerts which include information on a bill under consideration and a process for communicating with legislators. The Montana Catholic Conference advocates, educates and communicates with interested citizens on bills



related to 1) the welfare of the most vulnerable among us - e.g. Medicaid expansion and the housing crisis; 2) the dignity of the human person - e.g. capital punishment and abortion; and 3) church law - e.g. the sacred seal of confession and mandatory reporting of abuse. The primary areas of focus of the 2025 legislature are Medicaid expansion, changes in the judiciary branch of government, and property taxation.

Lay people have a key role to play. Pope Benedict described the Catholic laity as not only collaborators but as having co-responsibility in evangelization and in serving the common good. Lay people advocating for just policy, laws and economics is a way of loving God and loving our neighbors as God loves us. It creates the conditions for social justice to flourish. We must guard against withdrawal, apathy and cynicism and work to engage and participate in politics and civic actions.

It is often more expensive for companies to pay for returned items to be inspected, cleaned, and put back on the shelf than it is for them to be landfilled. According to NPR, "Experts estimate that retailers throw away about a quarter of their returns. Returns and resale company Optoro estimates that every year, *U.S. returns create almost 6 billion pounds of landfill waste*."

Pray

Today we pray for the social sin of excessive consumption and waste and disregard of earth's gifts. We pray to temper our own wants and desires and for systemic solutions that promote justice and care for all people and the planet.

Act

It is not always possible, but if it is an option for you, avoid buying online, when possible, since items bought in local stores are less likely to be returned and are less likely to be destroyed or put in the landfill if they are returned.

The Darker Side to Returned Products - What really happens to all of our returned products?

- Online purchases are 3x more likely to be returned than items bought in a store.
- Amazon ends up throwing away 1/3 of returned items.
- **6 billion pounds of landfill waste**. That is about equal to the amount of waste produced by 3.3 million Americans each year.
- Retailers will burn products as a means of disposal or in some cases to protect their brand.
- Amazon has donated over sixty million items and is working on other ideas to reduce waste.





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
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
