

#### **Decree on Designating Sacred Places for the Jubilee Indulgence**

To the faithful of the Diocese of Helena:

Greetings to you this Jubilee Year of Hope! Last May, our Holy Father Pope Francis released the Bull of Indiction *Spes non confundit* ("Hope does not disappoint") announcing this Jubilee Year 2025. A Jubilee Year is a significant time in the life of the Church marked by pilgrimages, processions, and a special invitation to the Sacrament of Penance. In it, we are called to receive God's mercy by participating in the Corporal and Spiritual Works of Mercy and, in a special way, through the practice of the Jubilee Indulgence. In response to this, and in accordance with the directives of the Holy See, I, Austin Anthony Vetter, Bishop of Helena, hereby designate the following sacred places within the Diocese of Helena as places where the faithful may obtain the Jubilee Indulgence:

- Cathedral of St. Helena, Helena
- St. Teresa of the Little Flower Church, Browning
- St. Joseph Church, Libby
- St. Ignatius Mission Church, St. Ignatius
- St. Rose of Lima Church, Dillon
- Holy Rosary Church, Bozeman
- All Saints Chapel, Carroll College, Helena

These sacred places have been chosen to reflect the spiritual significance of pilgrimage and to foster deeper conversion among the people of God. The visit is not merely an outward action but a reflection of the soul's pilgrimage toward God. In making a pilgrimage or pious visit to these sacred places, the faithful may gain the Plenary Indulgence by fulfilling the following conditions:

- Participation in the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass (or another service such as the Liturgy of the Hours, the Way of the Cross, or the Rosary) and Reception of Holy Communion (at least within 7 days before or after the visit)
- Prayer for the intentions of our Holy Father Pope Francis
- A sincere detachment from sin, including making a Sacramental Confession (at least within 7 days before or after the visit)

Those who cannot participate in a pilgrimage or pious visit for a serious reason may obtain the Jubilee Indulgence by being truly repentant, reciting the Lord's Prayer, Nicene Creed, and prayers for the Jubilee Year, offering up their sufferings. Furthermore, the faithful may obtain the indulgence by participating seriously in the Corporal and Spiritual Works of Mercy as if making pilgrimage to Christ present in those served, especially to share hope.

Despite the rule that only one plenary indulgence can be obtained per day, the faithful who have carried out an act of charity on behalf of the souls in Purgatory, if they receive Holy Communion a second time that day at a Eucharistic Celebration, can obtain the plenary indulgence twice on that same day, applicable only to the deceased.

The period for obtaining the Jubilee Indulgence coincides with the Jubilee Year, as outlined by the Holy See, beginning December 29, 2024, and ending on December 28, 2025.

## From Father Tim

Saint Thomas Aquinas was a Dominican Priest and "Angelic Doctor" of the Church as he was known for his incredible wisdom and spiritual depth. He wrote the Summa Thologica: a compendium of the theological teachings of the Church. At the request of Pope Urban IV, Thomas wrote several Eucharistic hymns. He is the patron saint of Catholic schools, colleges, and universities, as well as patron saint of philosophers, theologians, and booksellers. He died in 1274. The following is from a Conference by Saint Thomas.

"Why did the Son of God have to suffer for us? There was a great need, and it can be considered in a twofold way: in the first place, as a remedy for sin, and secondly, as an example of how to act...

If you seek the example of love: Greater love than this no man has, than to lay down his life for his friends. Such a man was Christ on the cross. And if he gave his life for us, then it should not be difficult to bear whatever hardships arise for his sake...

If you seek an example of humility, look upon the crucified one, for God wished to be judged by Pontius Pilate and to die...

If you seek an example of obedience, follow him who became obedient to the Father even unto death. FOR JUST AS THE DISOBEDIENCE OF ONE MAN, NAMELY, ADAM, MANY WERE MADE SINNERS, SO BY THE OBEDIENCE OF ONE MAN, MANY WERE MADE RIGHTEOUS...

If you seek an example of despising earthly things, follow him who is the King of kings and the Lord of lords, in who are hidden all the treasures of wisdom and knowledge. Upon the cross he was stripped, mocked, spat upon, struck, crowned with thorns, and given only vinegar and gall to drink...

Do not be attached, therefore, to clothing and riches, because THEY DIVIDED MY GARMENTS AMONG THEMSELVES. Nor to honors, for he experienced harsh words and scourgings. Nor to greatness of rank, for WEAVING A CROWN OF THORNS THEY PLACED IT ON MY HEAD. Nor to anything delightful, for IN MY THIRST THEY GAVE ME VINEGAR TO DRINK."

May we rely on the Lord at all times, knowing how much He loved us through His passion and death on the Cross for us and for the whole world. Saint Thomas Aquinas, pray for us!

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## Liturgical Life

Let Us Sing as We Go

I'm currently reading *Hope—The Autobiography* by Pope Francis. In the Prologue, he begins with a story about the shipwreck of the *SS Principessa Mafalda*, often called the "Italian Titanic." In 1927, his father and grandparents had planned to sail on that ship from Genoa to Buenos Aires but were unable to afford the passage. It saved their lives. God had a plan for this family.

Though delayed, their journey did not end. Driven by hope—hope for freedom, hope for family reunion—they eventually embarked on their journey later, eventually reaching Argentina. "That is why I'm here now," he writes.

Pope Francis connects hope to the future of the Church in his autobiography in a powerful way:

"The Church always has a future.... The Church has roots in the past, in Christ living during his own time, in his Resurrection; and it has roots in the future, in the promise of Christ who remains with us until the end of time. And in this promise there is the future of the Church."

For Pope Francis, hope is not merely optimism which ignores the tragedy of human evil; it is a deep trust in God's presence that transcends time. The Church's future is secured in Christ's promise—His living presence among us today, and His enduring promise to remain with us until the end of time. This promise gives the Church purpose, even though of all the challenges it faces.

As we leave Mass this weekend, we will sing Let Us Sing as We Go by Jaime Cortez. This song beautifully aligns with the themes of hope and the future of the Church, drawing inspiration from Pope Francis's Laudato Si.

- Verse 1 invites us to rejoice in the gift of life, underscoring the power of music to unite and inspire us in our shared journey.
- Verse 2 calls us to care for the Earth, echoing the Pope's message of reconciliation with creation and our call to stewardship of the world.
- Verse 3 emphasizes justice, peace and the collective responsibility to protect and nurture the Earth as our common home.

The refrain reminds us that our shared duty to care for the Earth is not just an act of responsibility but one of love, as we move together as stewards of God's creation. The song's message, alongside its uplifting and energetic melody, calls us to walk forward with hope. We know that the Church's future is deeply rooted in Christ's promise and our response.

As we go forth, let us be reminded that, just as Pope Francis teaches, the Church always has a future. Let us sing with joy, hope in the Lord, and trust that, through Him, the Church will continue to move forward, grounded in hope.

## A weekly tip on Caring for Our Common Home

It is important to learn lessons that first present themselves in family life: how to show love and respect for life; the proper use of things; order and cleanliness; respect for the local ecosystem and care for all creatures; how to learn and mature; how to ask without demanding; saying "thank you" in genuine gratitude; controlling aggressiveness and greed. "These simple gestures of heartfelt courtesy help to create a culture of shared life and respect for our surrounding." (Laudato Si', 213)

Lord, as we celebrate the Tenth Anniversary Year of Laudato Si' let us cherish your beautiful creation and hold Pope Francis in our prayers.

## **Art and Environment**

Saint Mary's Church was constructed in the late 1960's as the first church in our diocese designed and inspired in the spirit of Vatican II. And so, it is with our Baptismal font. Our font is designed following the Vatican II documents and the directives of the USCCB.

**When** you enter Saint Mary's sanctuary you are greeted by our font. There is an unspoken but immediate invitation to bless yourself with the Baptismal waters of the font. WHY? To remind ourselves again of our Baptism ... the beginning of our faith life in the Church.

**When** you enter Saint Mary's sanctuary you are greeted by a font that is significant in size, possibly not what you experienced as a child or what you see in other Catholic churches. This is so Baptism of both infants and adults by immersion can take place. Saint Mary's has been baptizing by immersion for over 30 years following the guidance of the Council.

Immersion is a very expressive sign: the person enters the font from the back, dying to sin through baptism, and then rising out of the waters from the front of the font to a new life in Christ in the Catholic Church.

**When** you come to Saint Mary's you may experience the Baptism of an infant during Mass. Parents present their child to the community for Baptism. The child is baptized with the whole community as witness. Children and others are invited to gather around the font to watch and experience the baptism. And our community is reminded of our own baptisms as we renew our baptismal promises together.

When you come to the Easter Vigil at Saint Mary's you may witness adult baptisms. With the restoration of the catechumenate, the practice of immersion is encouraged. The Catechism of the Catholic Church says baptism through triple immersion in the baptismal waters is the fuller and more expressive sign of the sacrament and is thus preferred. After the Easter baptisms, the assembly is encouraged to process to the font to bless themselves and state that they believe.

When you come to Saint Mary's during the Easter Season you will be blessed with water from the font. The celebrant sprinkles us with the water as he processes through the congregation to remind us all that our Baptism is the symbol of our participation in the death and resurrection of Christ.

Finally, when you come to Saint Mary's for a funeral you are invited to turn and face the font. As the funeral liturgy begins the coffin or urn is blessed with the waters of Baptism. The coffin/urn is then covered with the pall, a symbol of our Baptismal garment. A cross is then placed upon the coffin to remind us that we are baptized into Christ's death and resurrection.

**When** we come to Saint Mary's this **Jubilee Year**, we are invited to participate with the whole Church in committing and recommitting our baptismal journey by blessing ourselves with the baptismal waters of our font.

## **Update from the Pastoral Council**

The Pastoral Council met on February 12, 2025 and agreed that a brief summary of each meeting would be beneficial to the Parish.

Marelee Cloninger and Tyson Schulte attended their first meeting as student representatives on the Pastoral Council! They are WONDERFUL additions and will provide guidance on how to engage our youth in church activities.

The baptismal font project is progressing! Ed Glowienka, chair of the Pastoral Council, did an excellent job of providing an update on the status of the font project at the February 8th and 9th masses. All the materials to complete the project have arrived, and it is hoped that the font will be completed in time for the Easter season.

The security and safety of the parish and its members is a priority for the Pastoral Council, so subcommittees have been formed to address these issues. The security subcommittee includes council members as well as members of the parish with a law enforcement background. The safety subcommittee includes members with a medical background. Updates will be provided as these subcommittees bring recommendations to the Pastoral Council.

## **Saint Mother Teresa of Calcutta**

1910-1997

known for working for the sanctification, salvation and material needs of "the poorest of the poor" and loving those "who have no one to love them"

"By blood, I am Albanian. By citizenship I am an Indian. By faith I am a Catholic nun. As to my calling, I belong to the world. As to my heart, I belong entirely to Jesus." ~ Saint Teresa of Calcutta

At age 18 Anjeze Gonxhe Bojaxhiu left her mother, sister and her home in Albania to join the Sisters of Loretto in Ireland. She received the name Mary Teresa after Saint Therese of Lisieux as she was deeply inspired by her motto of "doing small things with great love." A year later she moved to India realizing her childhood dream of becoming a missionary. There she completed the process of becoming a nun and taught school which she dearly loved. She was known for her charity, unselfishness, deep love for her students and religious sisters, and profound prayer.

Her "call within the call" began in 1946 on a train ride to Darjeeling for her annual retreat. Over the next several months Jesus came into her heart through interior locutions and visions. He revealed His desire for all souls to experience His love, His pain at the neglect of the poor and His sorrow at their ignorance of Him. Mother Teresa struggled with temptations to keep teaching her beloved students but two years later she donned the white, blue bordered sari, took temporary lodging with the Little Sisters of the Poor and entered the slums for the first time. Her spiritual call and was intertwined with the call to serve the material needs of the poor.

In 1950 Mother Teresa founded the Missionaries of Charity dedicated to serving "the poorest of the poor" in the slums of Calcutta. Their services include providing love, dignity and hospice care for people dying in the streets, running soup kitchens, dispensaries, mobile clinics, orphanages, schools and homes for children living with disabilities. Over the years the congregation grew to operate in over 133 countries worldwide. Mother Teresa received numerous awards including the 1979 Nobel Peace Prize.

Mother Teresa lived a Jesus-centered life. She began each day by attending mass and receiving the Eucharist. She firmly believed that Jesus in the Eucharist is the living presence, in a different way, in the disguise of the poor. She lived by the "five-fingered gospel" – *You did it to me.* Whatever we do to anyone, especially the most vulnerable among us, we do to Jesus. People need to experience love, dignity and the presence of Jesus as much as or more than they need their material needs met. She embraced every person she met with love and a blessing from God.

In a 1993 handwritten letter to the whole family of the Missionaries of Charity Mother Teresa encouraged them to really meet the living Jesus. "Have you seen with the eyes of your soul how he looks at you with love? Do you really know the living Jesus... from being with him in your heart? Have you heard the loving words he speaks to you?" She encouraged daily intimate contact with Jesus as "the real living person – not just the idea."

Another part of Mother Teresa's spiritual journey was her experience of what mystics, following Saint John of the Cross, call "the dark night of the soul." Pope St. John Paul once wrote, "Not infrequently the saints have undergone something akin to Jesus' experience on the cross in the paradoxical blending of bliss and pain." (Novo Millennio Ineunte, 27). It began after she received her "call within the call" and lasted for the rest of her life. It became known after her death when her diaries and letters to her spiritual adviser came to light. After much suffering, Mother Teresa wrote, "I have come to love the darkness. For I believe now that it is a part, a very, very small part of Jesus' darkness and pain on earth."

The faith, love, service, and close relationship with Jesus exemplified in the life of Saint Teresa of Calcutta have much to teach us and are a powerful inspiration to us all as we seek to follow and to live in Jesus Christ.






