

Catechesis of the Good Shepherd Help Needed

Next fall, Saint Mary Catholic Community will begin a program for our pre-school children called Catechesis of the Good Shepherd (CGS). This method of Religious Education follows the Montessori method. One of the important factors of CGS is building an atrium, a sacred space for children to develop their relationship with God. The atrium is designed to meet the child's spiritual needs through prayer, beauty, and silence.

The atrium contains many materials for hands-on learning which are simple and beautiful, such as dioramas, small figures of biblical people, and geographic materials such as the map of Israel and the City of Jerusalem. Everything in the room is scriptural and liturgical. It is purposely structured not as a classroom, but a place in which the spiritual life can be lived.

One of the things that we need are dioramas for different Biblical stories. You may have noticed this diorama in the gathering space! It is a diorama for Mary's House in the Annunciation. It took the person who make it approximately 3 hours. If this sis something you are able

Liturgical Life

Here I Am, Lord Dr. Wendy Yuen

God calls to each of us in unique ways. The timing, place, and circumstances of these calls are tailored to our individual journeys. Often, we wonder why God reaches out when we feel weak and inadequate. The apostle Paul reminds us in 1 Corinthians 1:26-29:

"Consider your own calling, brothers... God chose the foolish of the world to shame the wise, and God chose the weak of the world to shame the strong, and God chose the lowly and despised of the world, those who count for nothing, to reduce to nothing those who are something, so that no human being might boast before God."

What matters most is our response: "Here I am, Lord." Embarking on a faith journey into unknown and uncertain territories is both exhilarating and challenging. Prepare yourself for this adventure and embrace it with faith and courage.

One inspiring example of answering God's call is the story of Daniel Laurent Schutte. At 31, Schutte was studying theology at the Jesuit School of Theology at Berkeley. While still a seminary student, a friend asked him to write a song for an ordination Mass. The friend specifically requested that the hymn include images of the Word of God, the light of Christ, and the bread and wine.

Schutte recalled, "I sort of had to catch my breath, because he was knocking on my door on Wednesday and I knew the ordination was on Saturday." Despite suffering from the flu, Schutte prayed, "God, if I am going to do this for my friend, you are going to have to help me." In just two days, he completed both the text and music for the hymn, which became known as "Here I Am, Lord."

Daniel Laurent Schutte, born in 1947, is an American composer of Catholic liturgical music. He wrote "Here I Am, Lord" in 1979, and it was published in 1981. The hymn gained widespread popularity, transcending denominational boundaries and being sung in many Protestant services as well. The hymn is based on Isaiah 6:8, where the prophet hears the voice of the Lord asking, "Whom shall I send? And who will go for us?"

Schutte's hymn is framed with God speaking in the first person, beginning each verse with "I, the Lord." Verse 1 speaks of God hearing the people's cry in darkness; verse 2 emphasizes God's love and care for those with hardened hearts; and verse 3 highlights God's inclusive invitation to the feast for all, including the poor and lame. The refrain is our response to God's call.


Let us answer God's call with a willing and open heart, trusting in His guidance and love.

Here are some tips for elderly people to stay safe in the heat:

Stay hydrated

Drink water regularly, even before you feel thirsty, especially if you're outside or exercising. Older adults should drink 1.7–2.0 liters of fluids per day.

• Dress appropriately

Wear loose-fitting clothing and a hat to protect your face, neck, scalp, and ears.

Use sunscreen

Apply sunscreen with a high SPF regularly, as the elderly's skin can burn more easily.

Minimize heat sources

Avoid using the oven or stove to cook, and use blinds or curtains to block the sun.

Stay cool

Take a shower, eat light, cold meals, or have cooling snacks like frozen peas or popsicles. You can also try staying with a friend or family member who has air conditioning, or take an "air conditioning break" at a library or mall.

Rest

Don't overwork yourself, and make sure you have someone check up on you.





SAINT MARY CARE FOR CREATION MINISTRY

WERE YOU CONVINCED?

If you were alive in the 1950's or have parents and grandparents who talk about the "good old days" you will no doubt hear stories of family picnics beside a beautiful mountain stream where some could fish, some could play and some could take a snooze in the shade of a big tree. In those good old days everything that was needed for a picnic was brought from home, and everything was returned, to be washed and put away for the next outing. There were no throw away containers, no single use plastic bottles, no disposable cutlery to leave behind for someone else to deal with.

In fact, in those days, our parents and grandparents were still trying to recover from the very lean days of World War II---to throw away anything at all that could be used again was beyond comprehension for most of them. They were frugal, practical and appreciative of their material possessions. The world, however, was about to change.

It was in the 50's that the production of plastic began in earnest, with much of it being marketed as ideal for families since it was sturdy and not easily broken, thus reusable. Before long, unfortunately, the chemical and fossil fuel companies that manufacture plastic realized they needed to change their marketing philosophy in order to increase sales....people were not replacing their sturdy, unbreakable plastic ware fast enough to keep production and sales up. The resulting new product, along with a corresponding ad campaign was the beginning of the "throw away" world we live in now. Companies fought hard to convince people it was ok to toss a cup or a plate after a single-use---in fact it was preferable because they came at such a low cost and were abundant. The older generation was harder to convince since they had lived through hardship and scarcity but each generation to follow was further removed from the stories of the war, more inclined to look for ways to make their lives easier, less complicated, less "old fashioned". Plastic manufacturers happily seized on this new mindset and within just a few short decades plastic was everywhere and along with it, a constant reminder from fossil fuel companies that it all came with "toss away" prices. (1)

As big soft drink companies switched from glass to plastic bottles in the 1970's plastic waste began piling up so companies once again changed their advertising strategy: now they concentrated on recycling. If they said it could be recycled it was still a great idea. Even as this was happening, a 1976 study by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration had concluded that substantial recycling of plastics was unlikely in the near future. (2) As we know, this did not deter the soft drink companies. They are now some of the biggest plastic polluters globally.

Do you remember being excited... **convinced** to accept plastic to make your life easier? Could you be just as easily **convinced** now to stop using something that we know is polluting the air we breathe and the water we drink...killing marine life and birds in all corners of the earth and creating garbage that is likely to be with us for hundreds of years? Could you be **convinced** to give up single-use plastics?

SAINT FRANCIS PEACE THROUGH JUSTICE MINISTRY

Peace, Justice, Fauna, Flora



Every creature is a word of God.

If I spent enough time with the tiniest creature—

even a caterpillar—

I would never have to prepare a sermon, So full of God is every creature.



Meister Eckhart

When we think of peace and justice, the world of flora and fauna rarely enters the picture. The principles of Catholic Social Teaching state, "We are for creation...in interdependence with all God has made," leaving us with an array of open ended interpretations. So is one really out on a theological limb to imagine fellow creatures, even lowly flora, worthy of justice, of peace?

Some theologians and scientists have proposed that we reframe our perceptions of animals as well as plants. Elizabeth Johnson, CSJ, a renown theologian and distinguished professor emerita of Fordham University has explored this reframing in her recent book Come, Have Breakfast. (Orbis,c. 2024)

Sr. Elizabeth combined scriptural references along with writings of Pope Francis in Laudato Si, other religious writers and scientists to present a world where the same divine Spirit which has been breathed into human beings is also brought to fullness in all fauna and flora. With no small amount of evidence she states that: "On balance, the Bible is pervaded with what some scholars call a zoological gaze... (which) sees a mutual relation existing between God and animals." (p.49) In Laudato Si Pope Francis writes that "God is intimately present to each being without impinging on the autonomy of the creature." He continues: "The ultimate destiny of the universe is in the fullness of God...The final purpose of other creatures is not to be found in us. Rather, all creatures are moving forward, with us and through us, towards a common point of arrival, which is God." (LS80, 83)

Technology has allowed scientists to greatly expand our understanding of the cognitive awareness and communication ability of animals. For example, a study published in "Nature, Ecology and Evolution" (June 2024) found that elephants use individual names they invent for each other, and that these names are not based on imitation as with dolphins and parrots. https://tinyurl.com/3b6ypnsf Furthermore, as most anyone who has lived with an animal and connected deeply with it can attest, interspecies connection and communication attests to divine breath and sentience and is life-changing.

So what would peace and justice for fauna and flora look like? There are no rules here and no experts to consult, but here are some considerations:

Expanding our environmental awareness from making the earth sustainable for "future generations" to "future generations of all life forms." (Perhaps that's implicit, but not clear).

Supporting efforts to make our meat industry more humane.

Learning about and appreciating how varied and amazingly different are the sensory capabilities of other life forms (e.g. trees pass on information critical to survival through their roots).

Rememberin<mark>g</mark> creation always in our actions and our praise of God:

"O God, how manifold are your works! In wisdom you have made them all;

The earth is full of your creatures." (Psalm 104:24)
