Reflection – August 1, 2024

From a sermon by Saint Leo the Great, Pope

"Our Lord Jesus Christ, born true man without ever ceasing to be true God, began in his person a new creation and by the manner of his birth gave man a spiritual origin. What mind can grasp this mystery, what tongue can fittingly recount this gift of love? Guilt becomes innocence, old becomes new, strangers are adopted and outsiders are made heirs. Rouse yourself, man, and recognize the dignity of your nature. Remember that you were made in God's image; though corrupted in Adam; that image has been restored in Christ. Use creatures as they should be used: the earth, the sea, the sky, the air, the springs and the rivers. Give praise and glory to their Creator for all that you find beautiful and wonderful in them. See with your bodily eyes the light that shines on earth, but embrace with your whole soul and all of your affections the true light which enlightens every man who came into this world. Speaking of this light the prophet said: Draw close to him and let his light shine upon you and your face will not blush with shame. If we are indeed the temple of God and if the Spirit of God lives in us, then what every believer has within himself is greater than what he admires in the skies."

The love of God is beyond human understanding. The power of His love and mercy is, again, beyond human understanding. The Creator of the heavens and the earth and the beauty that is within them does not compare to the love God has for all of us!

Message from Pope Francis

I was struck by this powerful message from Pope Francis last week and I wanted to share it with all of you!

In order to be compassionate and respond best to the needs of others, it is necessary to take time out to relax and not be anxious about getting things done, Pope Francis said.

It is also a "social injustice" when working parents hardly see their children because of long hours away from home, he said, before praying the Angelus in St. Peter's Square July 21. "In families, fathers and mothers should have time to share with their children, to let love grow within their family and in order not to fall into the dictatorship of doing."

The pope reflected on the day's Gospel reading from St. Mark (6:30-34) about Jesus telling the apostles to rest after their return from their mission of preaching and healing. However, when Jesus saw the vast crowd that had gathered, "his heart was moved with pity for them, for they were like sheep without a shepherd; and he began to teach them many things," the verse says.

The pope said, "On the one hand, there is an invitation to rest, and on the other, Jesus' compassion for the crowd." Resting and being compassionate "may seem like two incompatible things, while they actually go together."

"Only if we learn how to rest can we have compassion. Indeed, it is only possible to have a compassionate gaze, which knows how to respond to the needs of others, if our heart is not consumed by the anxiety of doing, if we know how to stop and how to receive the grace of God, in the silence of adoration," he said.

There is a danger that "can threaten us when, for instance, our enthusiasm in carrying out our mission or our work, as well as the roles and tasks entrusted to us, make us fall victim to a kind of activism which is overly concerned with things to do and with results, and this is a bad thing," he said. "It then happens that we become agitated and lose sight of what is essential. We risk exhausting our energies and falling into bodily and spiritual fatigue," the pope said.

A person's life, society in general and even the church in its pastoral work may often be "held prisoner by haste," he said. "Brothers and sisters, let us beware of the dictatorship of doing!"

This can also happen out of necessity in families, he added, when one or both parents have to earn a living and sacrifice time that could have been spent with the family, for example, having to leave before the kids are awake and getting home after they are asleep. "This is a social injustice," he said. "Let us think about what we can do to help people who are forced to live in this way."

Pope Francis encouraged Catholics to ask themselves: "Am I able to stop during my day? Am I capable of taking a moment to be with myself and with the Lord, or am I always in a hurry, in a constant hurry for things to do?" He asked the faithful to find an "inner" place of rest even in the midst of a busy day and to be compassionate towards others.

God Sends Us Forth Dr. Wendy Yuen

The book *Too Small a World: The Life of Mother Frances Cabrini* by Theodore Maynard is a delightful read, skillfully portraying her life and mission. Mother Cabrini accepted the mission to serve dispersed Italians in the USA, though her childhood dream was to be a missionary in China. When Bishop Scalabrini of Piacenza suggested she serve poor Italian immigrants in New York, she replied, "But New York is too small a place for me." He then suggested the USA, but she said, "No... For me, the whole world is too small." It was Pope Leo XIII who directed her, saying, "Not to the East, my daughter, but to the West." Cabrini finally gave in, recognizing it was God who sent her to the USA to serve. She went on to build schools, orphanages, and hospitals in New York, Chicago, Denver, Seattle, and many other places, serving the poor and sick with her petite figure and accomplishing God's mission on a massive scale.

Tony E. Alonso (b. 1980) wrote both the text and the tune for *God Sends Us Forth*. The first verse of the hymn emphasizes the mission of us to go out into the world with the purpose of loving, serving, and spreading the teachings of God. It calls for living in a way that mirrors God's love and grace, with the ultimate goal of everyone coming to know and see the Savior.

The second verse speaks to us being spiritually nourished by Christ, driven by love, and guided by the Holy Spirit. It highlights the importance of addressing the needs of the world by making God known through both words and actions, reflecting the comprehensive nature of Christian mission.

The third verse focuses on reaching out to the marginalized of society, such as the hungry, thirsty, weak, and poor. It emphasizes bearing the presence of Christ, who offers healing and comfort to those suffering and burdened by shame.

The fourth verse calls believers to follow the path led by the cross, to go forth with peace, and to spread the message of God's saving love to all corners of the earth. This verse encapsulates the essence of the Great Commission, urging believers to share the redemptive and transformative love of God with everyone they encounter.

The tune, written in a minor key, displays a sense of simplicity and reverence, complementing the hymn's profound message. Just as God sent Mother Cabrini on her mission, He sends us today to different places to extend His kingdom. Let us embrace this call and be ready to be sent wherever and whenever we are needed. Are you ready?

Pope Francis, Laudato Si – A Christian Prayer in Union with Creation

This smoky weekend I began reading Bill Gates' new book, <u>How to Avoid a Climate Disaster – the solutions we have and the breakthroughs we need.</u> Gates articulates the facts and examples that have helped him grasp what is happening to our world's atmosphere and the impact it is having on our weather systems and thus to our lives and our world. He begins the book:

"There are **two numbers** to know about climate change. The first is 51 billion. The other is zero. **Fifty-one billion** is how many **tons of greenhouse gases** the world typically adds to the atmosphere **every year...Zero** is **what we need to aim for**. **To stop the warming and avoid the worst effects of climate change** ... humans need to stop adding greenhouse gases to the atmosphere."

Throughout the book Gates focuses on what can be done by individuals, governments, companies, entrepreneurs, and research and development teams. He exudes **hope** and believes humans are up to the challenge. He challenges and **encourages people to advocate for change** and **to evoke change in their own lives**. This is not a problem just for a few to solve but for the entire world to address.

The drought across the west continues to suck moisture from the soil, the trees, and the vegetation priming them for fuel for massive wildfires. The cycle of drought, drying and fires has dramatically extended the wildfire season across the west with hundreds of fires burning at the present.

The month of July has emphatically revealed to Montanans the incredible impact we humans are having on our Eden. Our beautiful world cries in pain as she fights to come into a balance that is familiar. Helena's smoke-filled dawn is greeted with a bright red sun whose normal hues are filtered out by the smoke from the wild-fires, some near and some far. The gauze of smoke filling the sky diminishes the moon's glow and shrouds the distant hills.

Our beautiful Montana summers have been caught in the grasp of burning forests. No longer do I just check the temperature to see what the day will hold, but I look at the air quality to decide if the particulates in the air are too hazardous for an outdoor walk. The beautiful forests, mountains and prairies always opened their arms to all, but this summer this is no longer a given as the month of July has dealt with fires, record breaking heat and smoke.

Throughout the world more and more catastrophes caused by the changing climate arrive and then depart. Air clears, temperatures cool, and life returns to normal. The visits are longer each year, but when they leave our lives often return to normal and we tell ourselves this isn't so bad. Dare we forget and continue life as before or do we heed these wake-up calls – a call for change and action in our lives. Do something today to make a difference for creation and for our children, and then encourage our youth, our friends, and our community to be stewards of our incredible world.

Gates ends his book with this thought, "We should spend the next decade focusing on the technologies, policies, and market structures that will put us on the path to **eliminating greenhouse gases by 2050**."

"Pope Francis has been clear about the interconnected nature and complexity of the challenges we face, and the need to address them **in unity**, ever mindful that it is **in God we trust**," Cardinal Cupick

For wisdom, strength and love in our efforts to protect God's own home, for fire fighters who valiantly protect our lives and forests and for all of those suffering due to the fires and smoke we pray to the Lord.


