

From Father Tim

We have heard the story of Zacchaeus in the Gospel from Luke on several occasions (Luke 19: 1-10), and it's a great conversion story. In this Gospel, Jesus is going through Jericho with no intention to stop. However, it was the Father's will that Christ was supposed to meet Zacchaeus.

Zacchaeus, on the other hand, was searching. He was not at peace in his heart. He had hurt people in his profession, and he had heard about Jesus who was performing great miracles and preaching about the kingdom of God throughout the region.

Zacchaeus was the chief tax collector in the Jericho region and he was a wealthy man. But again, he was not at peace in his heart. Zacchaeus was also short in stature, so he climbed a Sycamore Tree to get a better look at Jesus.

As Jesus is walking by, he looks up in the tree and says: "Zacchaeus, come down quickly, for today I must stay in your house." Zacchaeus was filled with joy, because he knew Jesus was the Lord, because Jesus knew who Zacchaeus was even before meeting him. The crowd was filled with anger, because Jesus was going to stay at the house of a sinner.

Zacchaeus knew he was in the presence of the Christ, and he wanted to turn his life to the Lord and begin anew. "Lord, I shall give to the poor, and if I have extorted anything from anyone I shall repay it four times over." The Lord knew Zacchaeus was sincere; that he was turning to Him with all of his heart. "Today salvation has come to this house."

The Lord is interested in the present. The Lord lives in the eternal now. All we have to do is make that first step to the Lord, and we are in His loving and merciful arms. As we celebrate Thanksgiving, may we be thankful for the countless blessings that the Lord has bestowed upon us in our lives. As we know in the depths of our hearts that there is nothing more powerful than the love and mercy of God. For that, we are forever thankful!

This Sunday we celebrate Christ the King! Here is a beautiful explanation about the kingdom of Christ given by Gerald Darring (St. Louis University: *Center for Liturgy*):

The Kingdom of God is a space. It exists in every home where parents and children love each other. It exists in every region and country that cares for its weak and vulnerable. It exists in every parish that reaches out to the needy. The Kingdom of God is a time. It happens whenever someone feeds a hungry person, or shelters a homeless person, or shows care to a neglected person. It happens whenever we overturn an unjust law, or correct an injustice, or avert a war. It happens whenever people join in the struggle to overcome poverty, to erase ignorance, to pass on the Faith.

The Kingdom of God is in the past (in the life and work of Jesus of Nazareth); it is in the present (in the work of the Church and in the efforts of many others to create a world of goodness and justice); it is in the future (reaching its completion in the age to come). The Kingdom of God is a condition. Its symptoms are love, justice, and peace. Jesus Christ is king! We pray today that God may free all the world to rejoice in his peace, to glory in his justice, to live in his love.

Voice of Christ Dr. Wendy Yuen

A few weeks ago, I headed to Dive Bakery for a Halloween cookie decorating class. On the table were different colors of icing, cookie tools, and six big sugar cookies — ready to craft. The teacher first taught us to outline around the cookies using a thicker icing, then we used a thinner icing to fill in the middle of each cookie. That outside-in icing step is called flood icing. It was a fun process and more difficult than I thought. I needed to have a steady hand to apply the right amount of pressure to squeeze icing onto six cookies with six unique designs. Though I used my utmost attention, there were imperfections such as the border was not filled completely nor smoothly.

Afterward, I was exhausted. I sat on the chair, resting, and I started to chat with the teacher. She told me that she was the owner of the bakery, and the other fellow student was her mother. To my surprise, they told me that they used to come to St. Mary but for various reason stopped coming. I seized the opportunity to invite them back to church. It was a simple gesture but a meaningful one. Right there, in a cookie-decorating class at Dive Bakery, I became Christ's ambassador—a role I never expected in such a place. In that moment, I was His hands, eyes, and voice.

This experience reminded me: even the smallest acts can make a difference. Never underestimate the power of your simple gestures!

Timothy R. Smith's *Voice of Christ* perfectly captures this message of being Christ's ambassador. Commissioned by the Archdiocese of Detroit, this liturgical piece blends traditional and contemporary styles, showcasing Smith's talent as the Director of Music at Our Lady of the Lakes Church and a prolific composer of works like *In the Breaking of the Bread* and *In Every Age*.

The song's vibrant refrain calls us to be Christ's hands, eyes, and voice in the world. Verse one reflects gratitude for God's blessings, inspiring us to share them with others. Verse two reminds us of God's care for all creation, from sparrows to flowers, and invites us to trust in His provision. Verse three emphasizes God's compassion for the poor and encourages us to serve them with love, promising joy in return. Verse four speaks of watchful waiting for the Lord's return, urging us to stay prepared and faithful.

As we approach a new liturgical year, let's embrace a resolution: to live as Christ's ambassadors—making a difference, one small act at a time. Be Christ's hands, eyes, and voice.

Art and Environment

Fanning the Fire Illuminating Our Home for the Lord

Throughout the four seasons we experience in Montana, we observe changes in the color of our environment. Spring is green showing new growth. Summer is a deeper green showing mature growth and then brown as the summer months remain warm with less rainfall. Fall transitions into a multitude of reds, oranges, yellows and browns. Finally, winter offers a blanket of white in contrast to the blue mountains against the darkened sky. We also experience changing seasons and colors within our church. Each season is expressed in the color of the vestments and the church environment. Purple or Violet are the colors that precede a feast (Advent and Lent). White is the color of a feast (Christmas and Easter). Green is the color after the feast (Ordinary Time).

We begin the new church year with the First Sunday of Advent. In advent the color of purple/violet is the primary color with the color rose used on the 3rd Sunday of Advent (Gaudete Sunday). We bear witness to these colors in the vestments, altar clothes, liturgical aids and the candles of the Advent Wreath.

As we gather throughout Advent, we will process one lighted candle into the worship space and place it beside the Advent Wreath. The candle holders, crafted in Missouri for our remodeled worship space in 1998, were designed to separate from the stand, offering us the opportunity to process our candles in times of particular significance.

Each family is encouraged to incorporate the colors of the church year into their home environment. Tangible traditions help to remind us of our ever-present savior, Jesus Christ.



SAINT FRANCIS PEACE THROUGH JUSTICE MINISTRY

Approaching Advent - Considering the Creche

The season of Advent begins soon. For the faithful it is both a time of quiet, reflection and anticipation – as well as a time of the hurried chaos and consumerism of the upcoming holidays. We each struggle in our own way for balance as we make room for Jesus in our lives.

Our lovely, unique Nativity setting begins to be displayed on the first weekend of Advent just as the statues of the saints are removed. Though an earlier depiction was found on a Roman sarcophagi in the 4th century, the first recorded Nativity scene was created by St. Francis of Assisi for Christmas Eve in 1223. It is believed that St. Francis chose a nativity scene to emphasize the *incredible Incarnation: that God, Creator and Sustainer of all that is, became one with us in the person of Jesus, leaving no question that creation – all of it, in its beauty and messiness – is also holy and sacred.*

The figures in the Nativity are displayed slowly, deliberately. In this bulletin and the one which follows in two weeks the *St. Francis Peace Through Justice Ministry* invites us all to contemplate these lovely figures and how they point the way for our own meditation and our actions for justice in the world.

The first week of Advent the only figures on display are the animals. One may perhaps ask, "How can sheep and cattle and other animals remind us we are called to justice and peace - justice for them? Peace? Pope Francis reminds us in Laudato Si: "The final purpose of other creatures is not to be found in us. Rather, all creatures are moving forward, with us and through us, towards a common point of arrival, which is God." (LS 83) Perhaps the first step toward justice for animals is honoring them and holding them in the respect and awe they deserve. A parishioner related this incident: she had been on an early morning run when she ran across a group of magpies gathered in the trees. However, there was a dead magpie on the street and one standing next to it. In small groups the magpies flew down and stood by the lone one, marking time with their feet, as birds do. Then that small group would fly up to the trees and another group would come down and this pattern repeated for several minutes. Do we not share a similar behavior when a friend has lost a loved one? And do not those magpies, who mate for life, deserve our respect and even a bit of awe?

In Advent week two the shepherds are added to the Nativity. Shepherds in Jesus time were some of the lowliest of society, if indeed they were even considered part of society. Unwashed, living outside, not having the meager comforts of people in Jesus' time, they would not be the first ones invited to any celebration. And yet, they were indeed the first, invited by the angels, to the most amazing celebration in the world – the Incarnation – God coming to join us in the person of Jesus. Today we also have those like the shepherds, living on the margins. The homeless certainly come to mind - surely Jesus would invite them in. Yet there are others outside of the security of society, many of whom contribute much to our everyday living, just as those first shepherds did as they cared for the flocks. Some of these are migrants, many undocumented. They may have come here as children and grown up to start a small business, or work in a barber shop. Some may pick vegetables in the vast fields of California or do our landscaping or clean our hotel rooms. Many have reaped the advantage of our higher education system. They may well have children and family here. How are we treating these people, the ones on the margins, though they may not appear as such? Are we affording them the acceptance and love that Jesus would? The safety and security that would unburden their deepest fears?

Let us pray that as we enter and continue our Advent journey, we consider how we lovingly and caringly journey forward with all creatures, and how we treat and advocate for those on the margins, the visible and hidden.

We ask this in Jesus' name. Amen.

Dear God, our Creator,

You revealed your love to us and creation once and for all through the coming of our Savior, Jesus Christ. By the grace of Your Creator Spirit, teach us to celebrate our faith in the Incarnation that took place in creation.

Dear Jesus, Savior of creation, we ask that You may **be born in us once again** as we seek to cultivate hope for our common home. As Your followers, teach us **to care for the dignity of all human beings and all creation**, now and in the future.



In a season too often marked by overconsumption and excess, let us give thanks and honor the goodness of all your gifts in the natural

world. Help us to contemplate the mystery of creation as we celebrate the mystery of incarnation.

We pray for today's victims of global warming, both human and nonhuman. We pray for more ambition in the energy transition, in this country and globally. We pray for our governments to negotiate a global and fair phase-out of fossil fuels.



And, finally, we pray for the courage to be prophets of our time, calling upon our leaders to bear fruits of ecological justice.
