**We discovered within the last two weeks that one of the two twin furnaces in the church basement is not working, when the blower motor went out in the one furnace which was working. A contractor was called to fix the blower motor and indicated there is not much useful life left in the furnaces, as they are approximately 30 years' old. Therefore, the decision has been made to replace the furnaces, hopefully before the hard cold hits in January/February, in order that we have heat in the church building. We have \$51,622 in M&R Savings from which to draw on for the furnace replacement, but this replacement will take a bite out of that saving account.

Monies from the Alden P. Howell Permanent Memorial Endowment Fund (\$5,355) were received from the Foundation of the Diocese of Helena at the beginning of November and placed in M&R Savings.

From Father Tim

As most of you know, I recently returned from a trip to Africa – Tanzania specifically. We have three priests in our Diocese helping us who are part of the Apostolic Life Community of Priests. And it is their 50th anniversary of a religious order. At the Jubilee Mass that was celebrated, there were 150 priests and approximately eight Bishops from England, Germany, and of course Africa. Since there are only about five priests from the Order who live at the provincial house in Tanzania, I was wondering what they were going to do with the priest chasubles. They gave them to us to take home. A very nice gift indeed. I will be wearing the chasuble in the coming weeks, and it will be a nice addition to our collection.

The trip itself was challenging, 20 hours both ways. It was 'crazy,' in a good way to arrive in Africa. In the back of my mind, I always had an interest in going there, but it was a passing thought that came and went over the years. When we arrived at the Kilimanjaro airport, I couldn't believe I was there. Our trip included several 'moves,' as we stayed at a home operated by the Order a couple of different times – and moved to a location that was close to where we did the Safari to see the animals. Seeing the elephants, and all the various animals, and the grace and elegance of giraffes in their native land was awesome!

The celebration of Mass was wonderful, as people were dancing and singing to their hearts content. They are a joyous people because they are reliant on their faith in God and trust in their families amidst their challenges of poverty in their lives. The smiles on the people's faces were wonderful. Because their joy is in the Lord, who made the heavens and the earth.

It was a wonderful, yet taxing trip. I am very glad I went there, and have a lifetime of memories to show for it. But if you plan a trip to Africa someday, keep in mind that is a challenging trip – but it is very well worth it. May all of you have a wonderful and holy Advent filled with the grace and peace of Christ!

A People That In Darkness Walked

As we light the second candle of Advent, we are called to reflect on Christ's promise to bring light into a world overshadowed by suffering and sin. This week's hymn, *A People That in Darkness Walked*, written by Father Michael Joncas, invites us into the prophetic words of Isaiah:

"The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; those who dwelt in a land of deep darkness, on them has light shone." – Isaiah 9:2

In a time when wars rage across Ukraine, the Middle East, Africa, and Asia, the hymn's seventh verse strikes me:

"What must we do to end war's curse? The lives extinguished without cause..."

This heartfelt plea for guidance resonates with a powerful true story from Christmas 1914, during World War I. British and German soldiers, entrenched along the Western Front in one of history's darkest moments, experienced an extraordinary act of peace.

On Christmas Eve, German soldiers began singing "*Stille Nacht"* (*Silent Night*). Their voices floated across no man's land, and soon British soldiers joined in, singing the carol in English. By Christmas morning, soldiers from both sides emerged from their trenches to exchange greetings, share small gifts, and even play a game of football.

This event, known as the Christmas Truce of 1914, offered a brief but profound glimpse of hope, unity, and humanity amidst the horrors of war. While the truce was fleeting, it remains a powerful reminder of Christ's light breaking through the darkest of circumstances. The shared singing reflected a deep longing for an end to violence, a recognition of shared humanity, and an echo of the hymn's question: "*What must we do to end war's curse?*"

Joncas' hymn captures the tension between humanity's suffering and the hope found in God's promise. Its modal melody invites us into deep reflection, challenging us to consider our role in bringing peace to a fractured world. As we sing the hymn's final verse, we are reminded of the Holy Spirit's power to transform us. This verse is both a prayer and a challenge—to allow the Spirit to ignite within us the courage to be agents of peace and justice, aligning our lives with God's will.

As we journey through this sacred season, may we ask ourselves: "What must we do?"

May we prepare our hearts for Christ's coming and strive to be bearers of His light in a world yearning for redemption, peace, and unity. Let us live these Advent days ablaze with His love, bringing the promise of peace to all.

The Creche – Saint Mary Catholic Community

Do you have a Nativity/Creche at your home? Perhaps it is a special family heirloom or tradition to set out the figures of the Nativity. Did you know we have a special creche at Saint Mary's, one that was designed and carved by a local artist from Helena?

In 1989, Scot Walter was commissioned by the parish Liturgical commission to create and sculpt our Creche. As a sculptor, he was diligent in not only the carving, but also studied the history of the time of Jesus to be accurate and authentic in his depictions of the figures. One interesting fact is that the wood he used is yellow poplar from the Anselmo mine yard in Butte.

Throughout the years, the figures have been placed throughout the Advent/Christmas season. You are invited to take time and observe the figures as part of your Advent/Christmas reflection. Notice the details in the figures. Did you know that Joseph is holding the type of oil lamp that would have been used at that time? Note the presence of a woman in the scene and a crippled shepherd. Do you wonder why? And the Three Kings... at that time they were astronomers or astrologists studying the stars.

The Creche at Saint Mary is our special Nativity. It calls us to reflect on a Christmas tradition...and hopefully it calls us to find anew Christ born into our world...Christ born into our hearts.

Advent Journey – Considering the Creche

The season of Advent continues with weeks three and four. In the last bulletin the animals and the shepherds offered reflections on our connection with animals and our need to be in solidarity with those on the margins.

In week 3 the crippled boy and the young girl, the inn keeper's daughter, are added to the creche. Few would argue that someone who is crippled, or blind does not need special accommodations and help. And most of us have a general understanding that the ADA (Americans with Disabilities Act) requires restaurants and public places have wheelchair access and special parking spots. However, the ADA is a broad umbrella covering several titles and acts that include protections and accommodations for employment, public transportation, telecommunications, voting accommodations and housing – to name a few. It also requires that students with learning disabilities receive appropriate educational accommodations in public schools, whether for dyslexia, autism, or many other neurodivergent traits. Back to the creche. Can the crippled boy remind us of our obligation to view whatever disability one has with understanding, compassion, and a commitment to protect their rights?

The inn keeper's daughter stands out because in traditional nativity settings the only woman present is Mary, the mother of Jesus! Yet here she is, and is there any question that when Jesus was born, there may have been women around as well? Is it not hard to imagine that a woman, acting as a midwife as women did, might not have been there? And surely there would have been need of the clean water brought by the inn keeper's daughter. Does not our society and our Church often overlook or minimize the importance of women or deny them the full exercise of their agency, talents, and skills? Are there actions needed to press forward for the equal dignity and rights of women?

In week 4 the angel and Mary are added to the Nativity. We may also see the three astronomers placed at a distance, somewhere in the church. What reflection on justice and peace does the angel offer? The ideas are unlimited, but two characteristics attributed to angels may come to mind. Angels are often messengers, and they are often thought to be protectors. In his first inaugural address Abraham Lincoln referred to "the better angels of our nature." Can we act as our "better angels" in speech, actions, conciliation, and reconciliation, especially at this time of such division? And can we also choose to protect and guide, in whatever way we can, those struggling mentally, those with addiction and those struggling with the less fortunate aspects of their lives, whatever they may be?

Perhaps Mary, the mother of Jesus, offers the most compelling challenges of all. It is Mary who brings us face to face with trusting God in our difficult circumstances – not just individually, but in our country, our Church, the world. Mary's trust is anything but passive for she chooses to do the most hard thing – to be the mother of our Lord, Jesus the Christ. What circumstances in our life, what challenges do we face, that call us not only to put our trust in God, but to do the hard thing? Do we put aside our biases? Do we see the face of Christ in "the other" and act as the hands of Christ – whether in family, work, Church, or our country?

During this time, we may see the three astronomers placed at a distance. They appear at the creche at Epiphany. They, too, offer food for thought and meditation. Who are the "wise men" in our lives? Who do we listen to? What people, what internet news sites, what podcasts, what books, what articles influence how we are in the world? How we see migrants? How we see those with differing gender identity? How we see those of other religions? The three wise men were not Jews. Coming from afar they may have been Zoroastrians from Persia. Yet they, of a different tradition, are welcomed, valued, and honored for the homage they bring. No matter who or what influences us, it surely impacts how we interact in the world. Can we choose as Jesus would have us?

Finally, Baby Jesus arrives at the creche. He is the culmination and fulfillment of the messages brought by those present at his birth. Yet He is also the beginning of our life lived in trust of God and service to one another.

Let us pray that we take this Advent journey forward with us in hope, peace, and care for all.

We ask this in Jesus' name. Amen

Contemplate the Mystery of Creation as We Celebrate the Mystery of Incarnation

Laudato Si' Movement Advent - Reflect and Act during the Four Weeks of Advent

Reflect: How do we find ourselves already 'weighed down' and trapped in daily life? How are we already witnessing nations 'in anguish and perplexity at the roaring and tossing of the sea' (Luke 21:25)? **Be attentive to how yourself and others suffer from the ecological crisis**, and consider how **Advent** is a time foundational to Christian hope which **encourages both contemplation and action** for the whole of creation.

Act: Think of ways in which Advent can be a time to unsettle your habits and comforts in order to focus more fully on Christ and to respond to ecological destruction. Give yourself the mission of 'reclaiming' Advent from its usual consumerist emphasis in order to lean into a more profoundly Christian understanding of this time.

Reflect: Reflect on the importance of the wilderness, deserts, rivers, seas, and other natural landscapes to the narratives of the Bible. How can we recognize the importance of such places to **our own personal narratives**, and how can we draw together ecological and Christian reconciliation?

Act: Embrace the possibility of veering away from ecologically harmful forms of consumption during Advent, and how instead this time can be centered on your loved ones. Think of whether you could go out with friends or family in a nearby green space and pick out organic material to create your own Christmas decorations, and how you can **appreciate the abundance of God's creation** while you do so.



Reflect: What does it truly mean to embrace **the call of the Gospels to kindness and charity**? How can we, in our own lives, live out this radical call against the grain of usual social and economic realities to reaffirm the distinctiveness of the Christian faith and hope?

Act: Consider participating in the life of your local community. This could be donating to a charity of your choosing, or **reaching out to people in need and engaging in conversation with them** if safe to do so.

Reflect: Think of how we are all **blessed by the presence of the Lord**, who makes Himself available to us without discriminating. How can we share that blessing with others around us? How can we similarly make ourselves humbly available to all?

Act: Center this Advent on quality time spent with friends and family, so that **presence may become what is gifted in this time**. Make this Christmas not about consumption, but rather about **contemplating what gifts we have already been given and are being given every day by God** and the people around us, and how in return we may celebrate and share this joy.

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




